Walking Pub Tour

Okay, you could call this a pub crawl, but with three hours to wander, you’re likely to burn off more than a few alcohol calories—enough to keep you upright—during this [Walking Pub Tour](#). Your charismatic tour guide will take you and up to 11 fellow travelers to four pubs (drinks not included), while regaling you with tales of Texas, Houston-style. You’ll get to know historic Houston, with its buildings dating back to the mid-1800s between well-paced sips. The small group size allows mingling and for the tour to be tailored to the group’s desires, whether to linger over a lager or lollygag at a . The group meets at The Cellar, enclosed in the multi-faced Georgia’s Market, a cafe/reading room/marketplace/wine bar, and then heads off to popular watering holes such as Market Square Bar & Grill, Char Bar, the Line & Lariat Bar inside the Hotel Icon, Warren’s Inn, the Hearsay Gastro Lounge and La Carafe, a wine bar inside Houston’s oldest commercial building.

Haunting Haunts

Since you’re probably not going to be getting much sleep anyway, why not take a tour of some of Houston’s famous [haunted sites](#)? Meet William, a friendly ghost who is said to pose for photos when requested, at the [Brewery Tap](#). Or encounter Carl, a former bartender, at what may be Houston’s oldest bar, built in 1866, at [La Carafe](#) wine bar.

Honky-Tonk Heaven
